CHICHIBU-TAMA-KAI NATIONAL PARK

The Chichibu-Tama-Kai National Park is characterized by its mountains and mountain streams. It includes such high peaks as Mt.KitaokuSenjo-dake, Mt.Kinpusan, and Mt.Kobushigatake, as well as the Daibosatsuryo- ridge and Mitake-Shosenkyo valley, and is the source of Fuefuki-gawa river and Tama-gawa river. These rivers have created steep V-shaped valleys, and this makes the beautiful sceneries around.

It is the closest national park to the Tokyo metropolitan area and has easy access and convenient transportation. You can enjoy hiking, mountain climbing, camping, fishing, and river climbing etc..

MT. KENTOKU

Mt. Kentoku has the summit with 360-degree view and offers various hiking experiences in forests, meadows, and rocky places. There, you can enjoy the oddly shaped rocks and traces of mountain worship. It is said that the famous priest Muso Kokushi, founder of Erin-ji Temple, practiced asceticism here and attained enlightenment.

NISHIZAWA VALLEY

This scenic spot boasts one of the most beautiful valleys in Japan. The valley, formed by the erosion of huge granite rocks by clear water, is truly a piece of natural formative art. The mountain stream flowing through the primeval forest creates several waterfalls, including the Nanatsugama godan Waterfall and the Mie Waterfall, which are full of mystical charm.

EX-MITOMI SCHOOL (VISITOR CENTER)

EX-Mitomi School is a tourist base with a visitor center in the Mitomi area. It's adjacent to Chichibu-Tama-Kai National Park and you can spend a slowly and peacefully time in the rich nature.



ERIN-JI TEMPLE

This is a famous temple founded by Muso Kokushi known as a Japanese gardener more than 700 years ago. You will see the various faces of the historical garden depending on the 4 different seasons. It is also known for Shingen's family temple and for a tragic place that Oda Nobunaga burned to kill a Buddhist monk. The temple treasures are displayed in the treasure hall.
